From the desk of Village President Greg Hribal

The Village of Westchester is now proudly collaborating with the Veterans Assistance Commission of Cook County hosting them in our courtroom weekly. Every Thursday, beginning on March 6, 2025, from 10am to 3pm, they will be available to provide services to veterans such as the processing of claims and answering questions about services available to all veterans.

The lines at the Secretary of State facility here at the village have increased with public notifications that a Real ID was required by May 7th of this year. Your current drivers license is still valid and will not expire this May as some have stated. A Real ID is a form of identification, federally mandated, that WILL be required for domestic air travel, and entry into federal buildings in May if you do not have a valid passport or global entry card. It should also be known, that Real ID's can be obtained at any time after May as well if the need for travel were to arise at a later time. Please visit the Secretary of State website for a full list of items that are required to obtain your Real ID to avoid visiting a facility and being turned away. As a reminder, Westchester's Secretary of State facility is a 65 year or older walk-in facility.

The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District is continuing its work along Addison Creek in our northern portion of town to increase creek size and clean out debris in an effort to improve water flow out of our community. This is a flood control project that coincides with their recently unveiled water detention facility in Bellwood along the creek. Engineers are seeking to remove almost 200 homes from the current flood plain in the near future which will assist in lowering or removing the required flood insurance that many residents can be burdened with.

The Village also continues to eliminate flooding concerns by televising our sewers regularly, jetting clogged or debris filled sewers and relining or replacing portions of sewers that have collapsed due to age. Over the past decade, a majority of sewers in town have been replaced or relined nearly eliminating the calls received during storm events.

At our February 25th board meeting, the village's contracted outside audit firm was present to provide us with completed audits for fiscal year 2022 and 2023 and give an overview of our finances during those periods. We ended 2022 with a net increase of our general fund balance of \$1,332,583 and ended 2023 with a net increase of \$2,041,449 adding at total of \$3.4 million dollars in our fund balance reserves over the two-year period. This occurred primarily due to staffing shortages in our police, fire and administration departments. The village's auditor intends on completing our fiscal 2024 audit by this summer.

In attempts to restore staffing to appropriate levels, funding pension liabilities and make needed building improvements and equipment purchases that were

deferred in previous years, the budget passed in April of 2024 showed a spend down of over \$800,000 of our previous year's surpluses. As we near the end of the budget year ending on April 30, 2025, at this time, early projections show expenditures are trending under the budgeted amount leading to a more balanced budget for this year.

The Westchester Food Pantry is seeking donations due to a reduction in food allotments being received. Cereal, peanut butter, jelly and meals in a can are being requested. In 2024, close to half a million meals were provided by the Westchester Food Pantry to over 6,000 households. Donations and volunteers are always needed. The Westchester Food Pantry is located at 1938 S. Mannheim Road.

Lastly, locally owned and operated, the restaurant Tasteful has announced that they will be opening on March 17, 2025. Located at 1929 Mannheim they will be serving pizza, burgers and wings for both dine-in and carryout. By supporting local businesses, you are supporting the Village of Westchester. Please shop local when possible.

The Westchester Fire Department wishes all of you a happy Spring! As the weather starts to warm up, we are seeing many of our village's four-legged friends sniffing the grass and paying visits to our fire hydrants!

We always like to remind our residents of fire safety for humans, but would like to spend this month advocating for fire safety for pets.

Did you know that cats like to chew on electrical cords and dogs like to put their paws up on oven knobs? According to Today's Veterinary Practice, "500,000 pets are affected by house fires each year, with 1,000 house fires started by pets themselves." If your little furball tends to jump up on the stove or your cat enjoys knocking things over in your home, make sure to use child locks on the stove and not have space heaters or candles around your pet.

You can also use baby gates or close doors as needed when you leave the home.

We have attached a pet safety sheet from the National Fire Protection Association for reference. You can also search online for more tips for your little cutie's safety.

Make sure to wave to us when we pass by you and your pets this Spring!



SAFETY TIPS

- Pets are curious. They may bump into, turn on, or knock over cooking equipment. Keep pets away from stoves and countertops.
- Keep pets away from candles, lamps, and space heaters.
- Always use a metal or heat-tempered glass screen on a fireplace and keep it in place.
- Keep pets away from a chimney's outside vents. Have a "pet-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter) away from the fireplace. Glass doors and screens can stay dangerously hot for several hours after the fire goes out.
- Consider battery-operated, flameless candles. They can look and smell like real candles.
- Some pets are chewers. Watch pets to make sure they don't chew through electrical cords. Have any problems checked by a professional.

SMOKE ALARMS

- Have working smoke alarms on every level of the home. Test your smoke alarms at least once a month.
- If the smoke alarm sounds, get out and stay out.
- Never go back inside for pets in a fire. Tell firefighters if your pet is trapped.

Pets and Wildfires

Make sure pets are included in your family's wildfire evacuation plan. Build an evacuation kit for each pet in your household. Ensure each kit is a size and weight that can be quickly and easily loaded into a vehicle when packing to evacuate.



FACT

Pets or wild animals have a part in starting about 750 home fires per year. These involve cooking equipment, fireplaces and chimneys, space heaters, lamps, bulbs, wiring, and candles.

Medical ID Bracelet Program

The Westchester Police and Fire Departments offer Medical ID Bracelets free of charge

What are Medical ID Bracelets?

Medical ID Bracelets would go around the participant's wrist for the purposes of identification, by use of a unique identification number. If the participant is confused, no-verbal or unable to communicate during an emergency or stressful situation.

All participant's information will be kept on file within a secure server of the Westchester Police Department. Each unique identification number will include but is not limited to:

- Name
- Nickname
- Date of Birth
- Address
- Emergency Contact
- Diagnosis
- If non-verbal how does participant communicate
- Medication
- Doctor

Information that may assist a subject

that may be confused and or stressed in a situation (certain likes, dislikes, music etc.)

Who Benefits From This Program?

Residents of Westchester that may benefit include those suffering from medical or mental health conditions such as:

Alzheimer's, Dementia, Autism, Developmental delays or any other medical or mental health concerns.

Bracelets

Each bracelet is made of a strong silicone material affixed with a metal face plate that will contain:

- Unique medical identification number
- The name and emergency number for the Westchester Police Department

You will need your medical and emergency contact information in order to complete the application. All information will remain confidential and only be utilized in the case of an emergency by authorized personnel.

Release of Information

The information contained within the Medical ID Bracelet will ONLY be

released to authorized personnel (Police Department, Fire Department, Hospital Staff) in order to assist in a resolution of an emergency situation.

Anytime information in the bracelet is utilized the person providing the information will complete the Village of Westchester Medical ID Bracelet Program Log.

CENTENNIAL

The Westchester Branch and the Westchester Train Stations

The Westchester Branch was part of the interurban train line's extension of service to the western suburbs. As conceived in the early 1920s, The Chicago Aurora and Elgin (CA&E) wanted to create a bypass for their Western line that would leave the main line at Bellwood and head south, with the idea of reconnecting to the CA&E at Warrenville. The CA&E was also called either "The Third Rail" or the "Roaring Elgin." Since much of the early Westchester area was open farmland, progress on that line could be extended without major obstacles on a one mile stretch from Bellwood to Roosevelt Road (formerly 12th Street). Samuel Insull and a group of developers had invested in 2,200 acres of farmland that was to be developed around the transit system, providing fast and efficient service for this newly conceived town of Westchester to the Chicago Loop. As the owners of the "L" at the time, the Chicago Rapid Transit Company (CRT) would operate the branch line. The Grant N. Britten camp on the former Hermann Pug farm (near the overpass on Mannheim Road north of Roosevelt Rd.) housed the many workers who would lay the tracks and level the ground for trains and streets. The Harrison Station, located just north of today's Eisenhower Expressway, was the entry point to Westchester. From there the line extended on the east side



of Gareld Park just west of Westchester Boulevard to Roosevelt Road. The Illinois Central would cross on an overpass right before the station. One can still see some of that historic train line right-of-way north and south of Kitchner Avenue where a line of telephone poles still exists. The platform at the Roosevelt Station was located on an underpass below the station.

In early 1926 an abundance of advertisements suddenly appeared in the newspapers about the model community of Westchester, which incorporated in 1925. People could buy lots and own houses and make a home in two- or three-story apartments built by developers such as Zelosky and Nixon. Those advertisements focused on trains with cheap and frequent service. Soon the train line to Roosevelt Road was opened on Friday, October 1, 1926, at 12:34 am. Celebrations that weekend centered around William

Zelosky's company office, located near the intersection of Mannheim and Roosevelt Road (the site of Westchester's city hall today). According to the Chicago Tribune, attractions included a "Texas Barbecue, a sh fry, and other features." William Zelosky had originally hailed from Texas! It took a great deal of 1920s exuberance to create an English-style development that might well lose money initially, content that it could be recouped in the future once lots were sold and homes were built.

Indeed, construction of the Westchester train branch pushed forward, with an extension from Roosevelt Road to Canterbury Street station taking shape. This was started in 1927, at first boldly but quietly, since the rights to cross Roosevelt Road had not yet been secured. By December 1, 1930, the branch continuation reached its destination at Cermak (22nd Street) and Mannheim Road. It never was extended further to create a bypass, as had been the initial aim. The single-track route used by a single shuttle car ran between Balmoral Avenue and Westchester Boulevard along the slight bend west of Balmoral to Mannheim Road. The station at 22nd and Mannheim was located where the proposed center of Westchester was to be with a civic center, a theater, a library, a park with a fountain, and a school. The Great Depression of 1929

halted all these ambitious development projects in the Westchester area, leaving empty lots and overgrown sidewalks. The trains continued to run, but in the 1920s people never anticipated that car usage would take precedence over train ridership. In the forties and fifties, after World War II, Westchester grew once again as new-home construction soared, but the use of trains declined. On December 9, 1951, service on the Westchester Branch was halted completely. The Pace buses later would follow the route of the former train line in Westchester. A bus stop replaced the station on Canterbury, and a bank replaced the station at Cermak and Mannheim. The main train line of the CA & E ceased to function by June of 1958 as well. A new era began with the creation of the Tri-State Tollway system and the opening of the Eisenhower Expressway in 1960 along the northern border of Westchester. This year, 2025, Westchester is revisiting its unique history as part of the centennial celebration of its roots as a model community planned along the Westchester train transportation branch.

The Challenges and Honor of Serving in Law Enforcement

Law enforcement has become one of the most challenging and least sought-after professions in the United States today. When I began my career in 1987, police departments would regularly see 150 or more applicants for a single position. Now, we are fortunate if we receive 30-50 applicants, and by the time the hiring process is complete, only 10-15 candidates may make the final list.

Rest assured, the hiring process remains rigorous, requiring applicants to undergo an extensive interview process, medical and psychological exams, a background investigation, and a physical agility test, which includes a timed mile-and-a-half run. Those who successfully complete this process then attend a demanding 16-week police academy, followed by an additional 10-week Field Training Officer program.

In 2024, the United States lost 162 police officers in the line of duty, and on average, another 150 officers took their own lives.

Departments across the country are struggling to recruit new officers, creating an increasingly competitive environment where agencies must offer the best benefits and highest salaries to attract candidates.

Being a police officer means always staying on guard, relying on instinct, and communicating effectively—even in the most difficult situations. Officers must maintain their judgment, compassion, and commitment to serving their communities, despite the many challenges they face. As in any profession, there may be a few bad actors, but the vast majority of officers dedicate themselves fully to making our world safer.

Regardless of the challenges, we remain committed to recruiting high-quality officers who serve with integrity, honor, and dedication to the Village of Westchester. While we protect our community here at home, it's also important to remember our brothers and sisters in the military do the



same far from home.

After 36 continuous years of service, I am still honored to be a police officer, even in these difficult times.

On January 18, 2025, at approximately 21:09 hrs, officers from the Westchester Police Department were dispatched to the 2200 block of Buckingham Avenue in response to an unknown disturbance. The suspect, who had fired shots, retreated into a nearby residence as officers approached. Officers from Westchester Police Department, along with personnel from neighboring law enforcement agencies, quickly established a perimeter around the residence and began negotiating with the suspect. After an hour-long standoff, Coakley released the children from the home and surrendered to police without further incident. He was taken into custody on charges of domestic violence and weapons offenses. The situation

caused temporary traffic disruptions due to the police presence; however, all roadways have since been reopened, and there is no ongoing threat to the community.

- If your garbage, recycling, and/or yard waste was at the curb by 6am but was not collected by 6pm on your regular day, please call S.B.C. directly to report a missed collection.

- You may place two (2) large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.,) at the curb every week for collection. Please call S.B.C. directly to inform them of large items.

- S.B.C. will collect household hazardous waste and electronic waste (e-waste), at no additional charge, including household chemicals, automotive products, paint products, garden chemicals, universal materials, batteries, long fluorescent lightbulbs, and swimming pool chemicals. This separate collection must be pre-scheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

Village Snow Restrictions

Public Works crews keep our streets free of snow and ice during the winter months.

Please assist us by observing the following:

- Place garbage cans 3 feet behind the curb line- do not place them in the street.

- **Do not shovel or blow snow back into the cleared streets.**

- Please observe the “NO PARKING SNOW ROUTE” signs.

-The snow portion of the signs will be enforced after 2 inches of snowfall between December 1st and March 31st.

If you reside on a Primary designated SNOW ROUTE, after 2 inches of snowfall you must remove all vehicles from the snow route. Vehicles must stay off the street until the streets are cleared thoroughly by the plows by Public Works. If the snowfall is continuing, the restriction is in place until Public Works completes the plowing for the day. Please check the signs at the corners of your block.

If you reside on a Secondary route, there is no parking Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday on the even numbered house side and no parking Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday on the odd numbered house side after 2 inches of snowfall. Please check the signs at the corners and center of your block for guidance. (This includes ALL side streets not designated a Primary snow route.)

If you have a Fire Hydrant on your

parkway, please help keep the hydrant clear of snow so that the Fire Department may easily access the hydrant in case of an emergency, and so that the snow plows may quickly identify the hydrants while plowing.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree be planted, sooner rather than later, on any parkway.

2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village. To request the list of 50/50 trees, please call the Public Works Department at 708-345-0041.

THE GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE: WORLD WATER DAY – MARCH 22

Water conservation isn't just a local issue; it's a global imperative. World Water Day, celebrated annually on **March 22**, shines a spotlight on the importance of freshwater and advocates for the sustainable management of water resources. Established by the United

Nations in 1993, the day inspires action to address water scarcity, pollution, and inequity.

This year theme of World Water Day is **Save our Glaciers**. Inevitably, the climate change affects drastically the glaciers, melting them down and pushing moreover for climate disturbances.

In 2025, nearly 1.8 billion people will live in areas plagued by water scarcity, according to the World Health Organization. By participating in World Water Day, communities can amplify their efforts, learn from global innovations, and inspire others to take action.

Saving Every Drop

Water is one of Earth's most precious resources. With increasing populations, climate change, and overuse threatening global water supplies, it's imperative for communities to adopt smarter water use practices. Small changes at the local level can make a huge difference in conserving water, ensuring its availability for generations to come. By utilizing rainwater, embracing greywater systems, and rethinking how we garden, communities can lead the charge in sustainable water use.

Harvesting Rainwater: Nature's Gift

Rainwater harvesting is a simple yet impactful practice that allows households and communities to collect and store rain for future use. By installing rain barrels or larger cistern systems, rainwater can be captured from roofs and used for irrigation, flushing toilets, or even cleaning outdoor spaces. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, rainwater harvesting can reduce household water use by up to 30%. Moreover, it helps reduce urban runoff, which often carries pollutants into nearby rivers and lakes.

Consider installing a rainwater harvesting system at home or in community spaces like parks or schools. This not only reduces the demand for municipal water but also builds resilience during droughts. Our Village Hall encouraged this practice through distribution of free rain barrels.

Smart Gardening: Plant with Purpose

Gardens can be both beautiful and water-efficient.

Mulching is an effective strategy. By covering the soil with organic material, you help retain moisture, reduce evaporation, and suppress weeds. Drip irrigation systems can also deliver water directly to a plant's roots, minimizing waste.

Greywater: A Hidden Resource

Greywater—wastewater from sinks, showers, and laundry—can be safely reused for irrigation and landscaping when treated or managed properly. By installing a greywater recycling system, households can save significant amounts of water. According to the

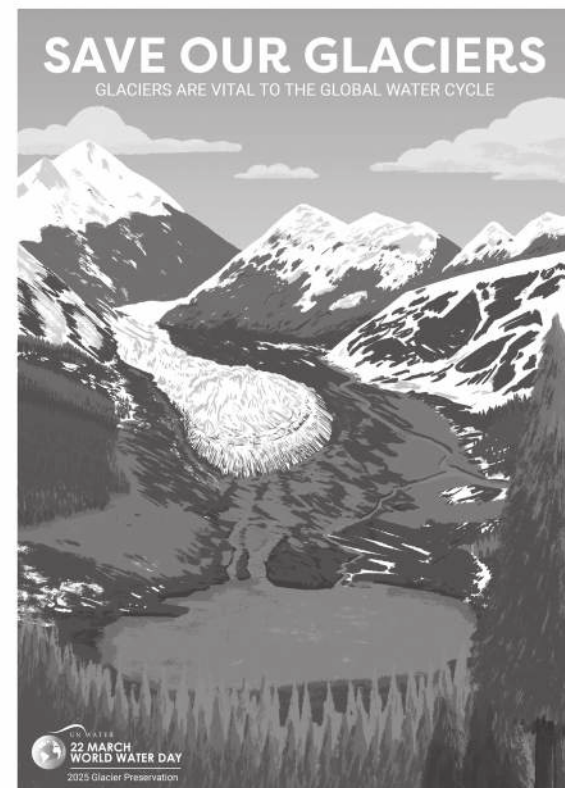
Alliance for Water Efficiency, greywater reuse can reduce household water consumption by 20% to 40%.

However, it's crucial to ensure proper filtration and compliance with local regulations before using greywater. Partnering with experts or community organizations can help make these systems accessible and effective.

Bottom line, small, intentional actions can ripple outwards, creating significant impact. By harvesting rainwater, gardening sustainably, reusing greywater, and educating ourselves on the global water crisis, we can contribute to a water-wise future. While individual steps are vital, community collaboration multiplies their effectiveness. Let's take this opportunity to lead by example, because every drop counts.

Checklist: Your Next Steps Toward Water Conservation

1. Install a Rain Barrel
 - Research local incentives or rebates for rainwater harvesting systems.
 - Position barrels under gutters to capture roof runoff.
2. Transform Your Garden
 - Choose native or drought-tolerant plants.
 - Install a drip irrigation system.
 - Use mulch to retain soil moisture.
3. Explore Greywater Systems
 - Learn about local regulations for greywater use.
 - Consult experts to design and install a greywater recycling system.
4. Celebrate World Water Day (March 22)
 - Share water conservation tips on your social media.
5. Reduce Water Waste



- Fix leaks promptly.
- Use water-efficient appliances and fixtures.
- Turn off taps while brushing your teeth or washing dishes.
- 6. Educate and Advocate
 - Share what you've learned with friends and neighbors.
 - Support policies that promote sustainable water management.

By adopting these practices, we can secure a brighter future where clean, abundant water is accessible for all. Remember, every step—no matter how small—brings us closer to a more sustainable world.

Recipe of the Month

The kitchen is a great place to think about reducing water use. When it comes to cooking, consider steaming or roasting vegetables instead of boiling, reducing meat and dairy consumption (they are water intensive to produce), and making one pot meals to decrease on dishes. This month's recipe is easy to customize with your favorite vegetables or potatoes and comes together quickly. Enjoy!

Vegetable and Chickpea Sheet Pan Dinner

Ingredients

- 1 ½ cups broccolini chopped
- ½ cup red onion chopped
- 1 cup bell pepper de-seeded chopped

- 1 cup carrots peeled and chopped
- 1 cup zucchini chopped
- 2 cups sweet potatoes diced
- 1 can chickpeas drained and rinsed
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- ½ tsp dried thyme
- ½ tsp dried oregano
- 2 tbsp tamari
- 2 cloves garlic minced
- 1 tsp cumin
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp paprika

Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F and line a large baking tray with parchment paper. Alternatively, you can lightly grease it with olive oil.

- Add the broccolini, red onion, bell peppers, carrots, zucchini, sweet potatoes and chickpeas to a large mixing bowl. Stir together well, then add the olive oil, dried thyme and oregano, tamari, garlic, cumin, garlic powder and paprika, and mix together once again.
- Transfer the vegetables and chickpeas to the baking tray, spreading them out into a single layer. Bake in the preheated oven for 35-40 minutes, until all of the vegetables are cooked through and crispy.

- Regular **refuse** and **small items** must be contained in **bags, cans, or boxes** (maximum 50 lbs each).
- There will **not** be a separate recycling collection truck. Any **recyclables** set out would be collected with regular refuse.
- **Yard waste** is **not** included but is collected on your regular service day April-December.
- **Hazardous and electronic waste** are **not** included, but a separate pickup can be arranged by contacting SBC.

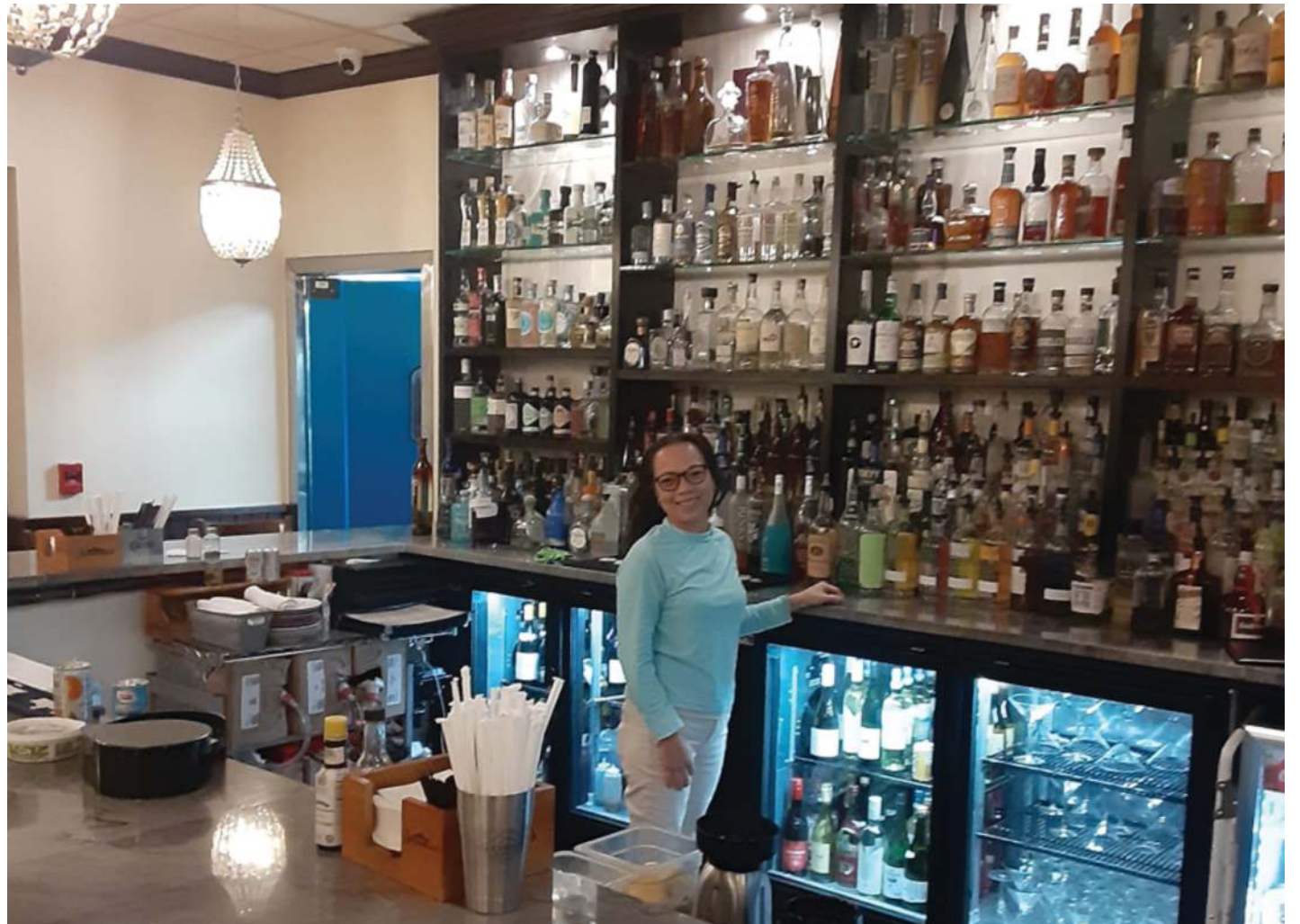
SPOTLIGHT Fine Dining & Martini Bar

When you walk into Thithi's Restaurant, there is an immediate sense of warmth and familiarity. Patrons are happily enjoying meals both at the tables and the bar. On one particular day, a loving couple and long-time Westchester residents are having a nice meal and can't help but talk about this wonderful restaurant, "This is the best food in town, what a hidden gem we have here!"

This is the experience you will get when you go to Thithi's Restaurant and the type of experience Thithi's hopes everyone has while visiting. Thithi's is a combination Thai, Vietnamese, and French cuisine fine dining restaurant, complete with a martini bar. The owners are Thi Thi Pham and Tam Nguyen. Thi Thi and Tam both came to America from Sagon - Tam in 1992 and Thi Thi in 2000. Prior to establishing her own restaurant, Thi Thi had helped her family run a restaurant serving Thai, Vietnamese and French fusion food in Merrville, IN and Calumet City, IL.

Although Thi Thi has a background in restaurants, her main goal in America wasn't to open a restaurant, but rather to have a career in the medical field. In fact, she is currently working on her Naturopathic degree at the National University of Health Sciences in Lombard. Even with her studies, she can't stay away from the restaurant business, making food and great drinks. When asked why she opened a restaurant, Thi Thi's response was, "I believe in God moments". Her husband was teaching, she was studying, and they were going to have their first child. She realized she had a background in restaurants and management and needed to do something to help the family. Thi Thi and Tam originally wanted a restaurant location close to downtown Chicago, but one day they were driving in Evergreen Park and saw the perfect location. Soon thereafter they opened the first Thithi's Restaurant in July of 2015, becoming very popular right after being featured on the local PBS show Check, Please! in 2016.

Thi Thi and Tam had a similar situation happen when they were deciding to open their second



location. They were originally looking at properties in neighboring Oak Brook, but nothing looked right. Then one day on their way home, they drove down Roosevelt Road and there was another of Thi Thi's "God moments". They saw the old D's Dog Hut building and thought it was the perfect location for the second Thithi's Restaurant. Thi Thi and Tam took on the endeavor of building a brand new restaurant, with a martini bar and beautiful murals painted on the walls. The second Thithi's Restaurant officially opened in September 2021.

Thithi's has a wonderful variety of foods, including salads, stir-fry, curry, fried rice and noodle dishes, pork chop, steak, lamb, poultry, and many seafood dishes. Some of Thi Thi's personal favorite foods are pho and mi vit tiem, pad thai, pad siew, panang, terrine de foie, jarre du porc, and duck confit. While Thi Thi loves all the food they offer, she especially enjoys making martinis. Thi Thi calls the bar her "chemistry lab", where she is able to test new combinations to come up with different, new tastes all the time.



While speaking with Thi Thi, you can tell she loves Westchester. She loves vibrant, safe, and clean the community is. She is clearly very loyal to her customers and there are many regulars who all speak very highly of her. The customers love that the Village has fine Asian dining right in our back yard. Thi Thi's belief is that once someone tries their food, they will want to come back, so she encourages everyone to get out of their comfort zone and explore something new! Thithi's currently

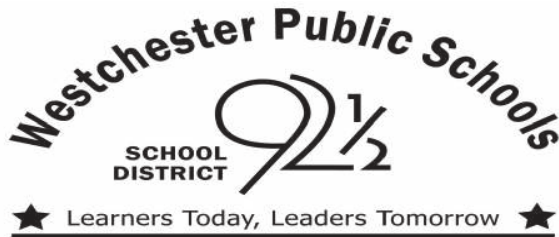

The 5Essentials Survey identifies five indicators that lead to improved student outcomes, including improved attendance and larger test score gains. The five indicators that positively affect school success are: Effective Leaders, Collaborative Teachers, Involved Families, Supportive Environments, and Ambitious Instruction. Westchester Primary School

Westchester Primary Students were challenged to “Leave a Heartprint” in February by using kind words, kind actions, and being the best they can be. We encourage our students daily to think about what they might want to be when they grow up and how learning helps them achieve their goals.
