Campfire Safety

Sitting under the stars by a crackling fire has its appeal. It's where stories are told, sing-a-longs happen, and meals are cooked over an open flame. Campfires bring family and friends together. But campfire mishaps can cause injuries. With a few safety tips, you can prevent these accidents.

SAFETY AROUND THE FIRE

- Before setting up a campfire, be sure it is permitted. Check with your local fire department.
- If campfires are permitted, they need to be at least 25 feet away from any structure and anything that can burn.
- Clear away dry leaves and sticks, overhanging low branches and shrubs.
- Avoid burning on windy, dry days. It is easier for open burning to spread out of control when it is windy and dry.
- Watch children while the fire is burning. Never let children or pets play or stand too close to the fire.
- Attend to the campfire at all times. A campfire left alone for only a few minutes can grow into a damaging fire.
- Keep a campfire small which is easier to control.
- Never use gasoline or other flammable or combustible liquids.
- Always have a hose, bucket of water, or shovel and dirt or sand nearby to put out the fire. Make sure to put it completely out before leaving the site.
- If your clothes catch fire, stop, drop, and roll. Stop, drop to the ground and cover your face with your hands. Roll over and over or back and forth until the fire is out.
- Treat a burn right away. Cool the burn with cool water for 3 to 5 minutes. Cover with a clean, dry cloth. Get medical help if needed.



ROAST WITH CARE

If roasting marshmallows, help young children. Never shake a roasting marshmallow. It can turn into a flying, flaming ball. A heated metal skewer can cause burns.

Be a Survivalist, Not a Victim

These days we need to have the mind frame of being a survivalist and not a victim.

We need to always be thinking of the worst possible outcomes in any situation, while planning out possible scenarios in our minds and changing the outcomes before bad things happen. Police officers use this type of thinking everyday throughout their lives to keep themselves safe and continue protecting our community.

We can prepare ourselves with just a few types of safety precautions to help secure our properties and loved ones. It's very easy to become complacent in life and assume that we will never be in harm's way of people who are determined to do bad things. Following some of the safety tips below will give you better peace of mind.

Number one best investment is deadbolt locks on all your doors with door knob reinforcement steel plates, which make it much harder for criminals to pry at your locks.

Always have a good solid wood or steel-core door to make it harder to make forced entry. You should have a wide-angle peephole at an average height to see outside before even opening your doors to anyone standing outside.

Always have a strong quality storm door that acts as a first barrier when deciding to open your main door to keep someone from forcing their way into your home. I also like a storm door that has outer steel rails throughout the entire storm door, adding extra strength and safety enforcement protection. Consider investing in doorbell cameras



and exterior security cameras that record individuals coming to your home 24/7 while alerting your phone. These recordings have helped our police department solve crimes in our community.

Always have bright motion lights around your household that luminate your outside perimeters and yards.

Never leave your garage door open when you're not inside your garage. Criminals will always look for an easy excess into your home with little resistance while catching you off guard.

Never ever let anyone into your home that you don't know for any reason, unless they have an appointment and official identifying documentation. Never let someone get you to step outside your

home, no matter what they're selling or willing to fix at a supposed great price. When in doubt call 911. We now have criminals disguising themselves as public workers or parcel delivery drivers, making you feel more comfortable in their presence.

Never give out any personal information, especially your bank information over the phone, text, or personal computer. No matter how authentic the individual may sound, just hang up and go to your bank in person to confirm if they contacted you. Most government agencies do not contact you by phone or text messages.

Offenders can now buy fake computerized phone numbers that cannot be tracked. They are experts at tricking you into giving up personal information,

passwords, and bank account information because they have the ability to use a trick phone number or fake website to make you believe it's really a representative of your bank or mortgage company.

These individuals may have already researched you through different computer technology and gained enough information about you to convince you it's legitimate. Sometime they catch you at the wrong time of the day, and you're busy so you quickly give up information and easily become their next victim, because they sound so convincing.

Be a survivalist, not a victim – just hang up or close the door and call 911!

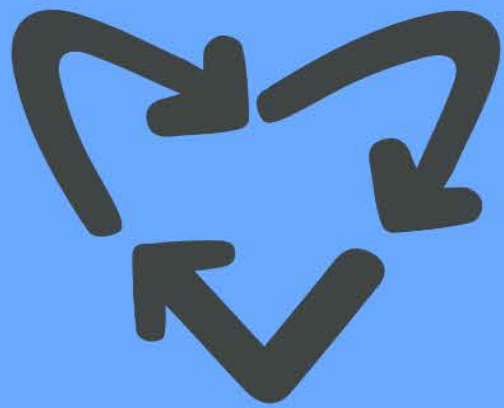

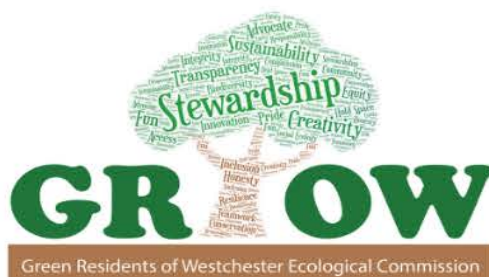

It’s a bird! It’s a plane! It’s a – million migratory birds?!

Summer is in full swing, marked by colorful garden blooms and the bioluminescence of light-ing bugs. While the days will remain warm for a while longer, by mid-August one of the first tell-tale signs of the coming fall will begin: Bird Migration.

From August 15 through November 1, millions upon millions of birds will fly south through Il-linois along the Mississippi Flyway, a major mi-gratory route connecting breeding grounds in the U.S. and Canada with overwintering areas in Mexico, and Central and South America.

Within just one night last September, BirdCast.info (which produces real-time maps of migra-tion intensity) estimated nearly 33 million birds crossed over our state. In Cook County alone, given our proximity to Lake Michigan and mo-saic of remaining greenspace, bird migration can reach upwards of 1.5 million birds in a single night.

According to iNaturalist.org, a social network used to record global biodiversity, Westches-ter has hosted many of the 250 species of birds known to migrate through Chicago. Ovenbirds, described as a chunkier-than-average warbler with a jaunty tail, spend summer farther north and then pass through on their way to Mexico and Central America, but at least one stopped in the vicinity of 31st and Kemman Avenue last September.

Others, like Ruby-throated hummingbirds, may spread into Canada come spring or opt to make Illinois their summer home, with documented sightings at Wolf Road Prairie and areas just north of the Park District’s Community Center. Weighing in between 0.1-0.2 ounces (less than a nickel!), many of these iridescent individuals will travel over 2000 miles to Costa Rica come fall.

Barn swallows make similar appearances in Westchester, then overwinter as far south as the southern tip of Chile. Round-trip, barn swallow migrations can total over 12,000 miles per year!

(For Monty Python fans, please note these swal-lows are NOT ladened with coconuts.)

As birds flock together, how can Westchester help?

Whether migrating a few states down or thou-sands of miles away, the majority of species mi-grate at night. Overnight hours are thought to allow migratory birds to take advantage of cool-er temperatures and gentler winds, avoid pred-ators, and, most importantly, to navigate by the moon and stars.

As a result, light pollution is one of the biggest obstacles our migrating aviators face. Artificial lights at night, whether from fluorescing office buildings or the porchlight next door, illumi-nate the night sky and compete with the moon and stars to disorient and attract birds. These birds may spend vital energy reserves flying in the wrong direction, or even in circles, and once they draw close to buildings, they are at much higher risk of colliding with glass. Glass colli-sions (often windows that reflect vegetation) may be instantaneously fatal or stun birds long enough to be preyed upon.

To help them secure safe passage, please consid-er these recommendations for your home and office spaces during the fall migration (Aug. 15 - Nov. 1):

Adjust outdoor lighting so it is:

- Useful: Use light only if it is needed (turn off decorative lighting from 11 p.m. to daybreak)
- Targeted: Direct light so it falls only where it is needed (shaded, pointing down)
- Low level: Light should be no brighter than necessary (draw blinds at night)
- Controlled: Use light only when it is needed (via motion sensors and/or timers)
- Warm-colored: Use warmer-color lights where possible (color temperature at or below 2700)
- Add bird-friendly decals to existing glass, and opt for windows that are less reflective or more opaque when the time comes.

- Keep cats indoors or restrict their outdoor movements using leashes and catios to reduce unnecessary predation and
- Plant a variety of structurally-diverse native flora (think trees, bushes, flowers and grass) to help sustain our avian neighbors.

PUBLIC WORKS

Village branch collection for August will be the week of August 4th – 8th

September’s collection will be the week of September 8th – 12th

October’s collection will be the week of October 6th – 10th

The Public Works Department will collect branches the first full working week of every month

(April-November)

• All brush must be put out on the front parkway by 7:00 a.m. on your designated collection day. Branches can be up to 7 feet in length and stacked with the butt ends facing the street in the same direction. If not stacked properly, a “restack” notice will be left.

• Again, please put ALL brush out on your designated collection day and Public Works crews will determine what constitutes an open load, which will be picked up later in the week.

• An open load would include any brush that will not fit through the chipper such as logs, stumps, and large limbs. These must be cut for one man to lift. Dirt must be removed from any root balls for pickup.

• Public Works Crews will only pass through a designated pickup area once due to time, scheduling, and other workload responsibilities.

Landscapers & tree services are responsible for their own debris disposal.

Please note the following schedule for branch pickup:

MONDAY: From Mannheim Rd west to Wolf Rd and from Canterbury St south to Windsor Dr-including both sides of Windsor Dr. Also Waterford, Waverly, Camelot and Concord.

TUESDAY: Roosevelt Rd south to Cermak Rd-from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd.

WEDNESDAY: From Roosevelt Rd north to the expressway and from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd. Also, Roosevelt Rd south to Canterbury St from Haase Ave west to Heidorn Ave.

THURSDAY: From Bellevue Ave west to Wolf Rd, Martindale Dr south to 31st Street.

Weekly yard waste collection by S.B.C. began on your first rubbish collection day in April.

• If your garbage, recycling, and/or yard waste was at the curb by 6am but was not collected by 6pm on your regular day, please call S.B.C. directly to report a missed collection.

• You may place two (2) large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.,) at the curb every week for collection. Please call S.B.C. directly to inform them of large items.

• S.B.C. will collect household hazardous waste and electronic waste (e-waste), at no additional charge, including household chemicals, automotive products, paint products, garden chemicals, universal materials, batteries, long fluorescent lightbulbs, and swimming pool chemicals. This separate collection must be pre-scheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

Street Parking Restrictions

From April 1 through November 30, parking restrictions are in effect to support street maintenance activities. Please check posted street signs carefully—it is unlawful to park or leave a vehicle parked during designated weekday hours on streets marked for maintenance.

These restrictions help ensure our streets stay clean and well-maintained. These restrictions are for one side of the street, once a week, 7am-3pm as designated by posted signage.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor

are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree be planted, sooner rather than later, on any parkway.

2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village. To request the list of 50/50 trees, please call the Public Works Department at 708-345-0041.

Village Watering Restrictions

There are water use restrictions in effect every year, May 15th to September 15th, from 12pm to 6pm. This includes:

- (1) Outdoor Watering
- (2) Cleaning Outdoor Surfaces
- (3) Cleaning Buildings
- (4) Pool Filling
- (5) Sprinkling/ sprinklers

Outdoor water usage during unrestricted hours (before noon, after 6pm) is allowed on even numbered days for residents with even numbered addresses, and on odd numbered days for residents with odd numbered addresses. If we have a dry summer, further restrictions may be necessary.

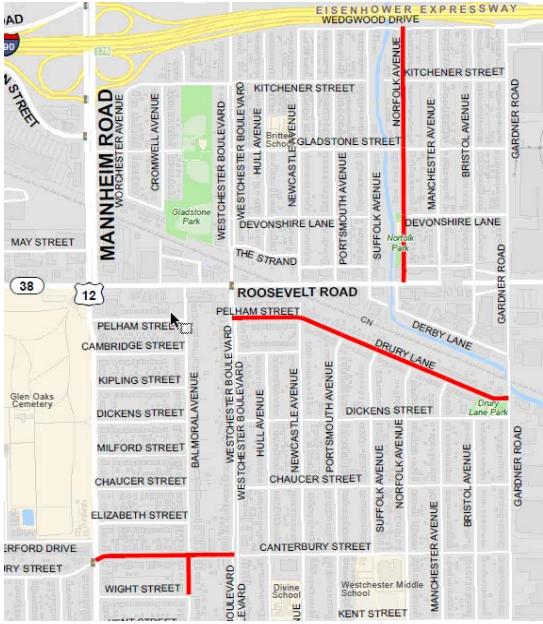
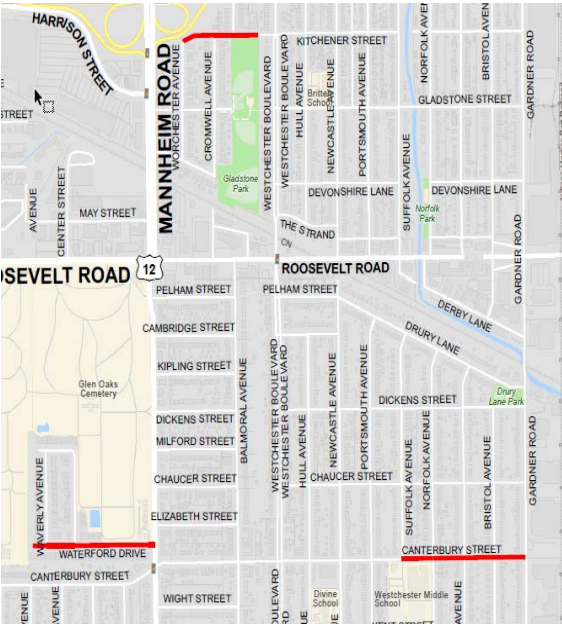

Westchester Street Names

Part II

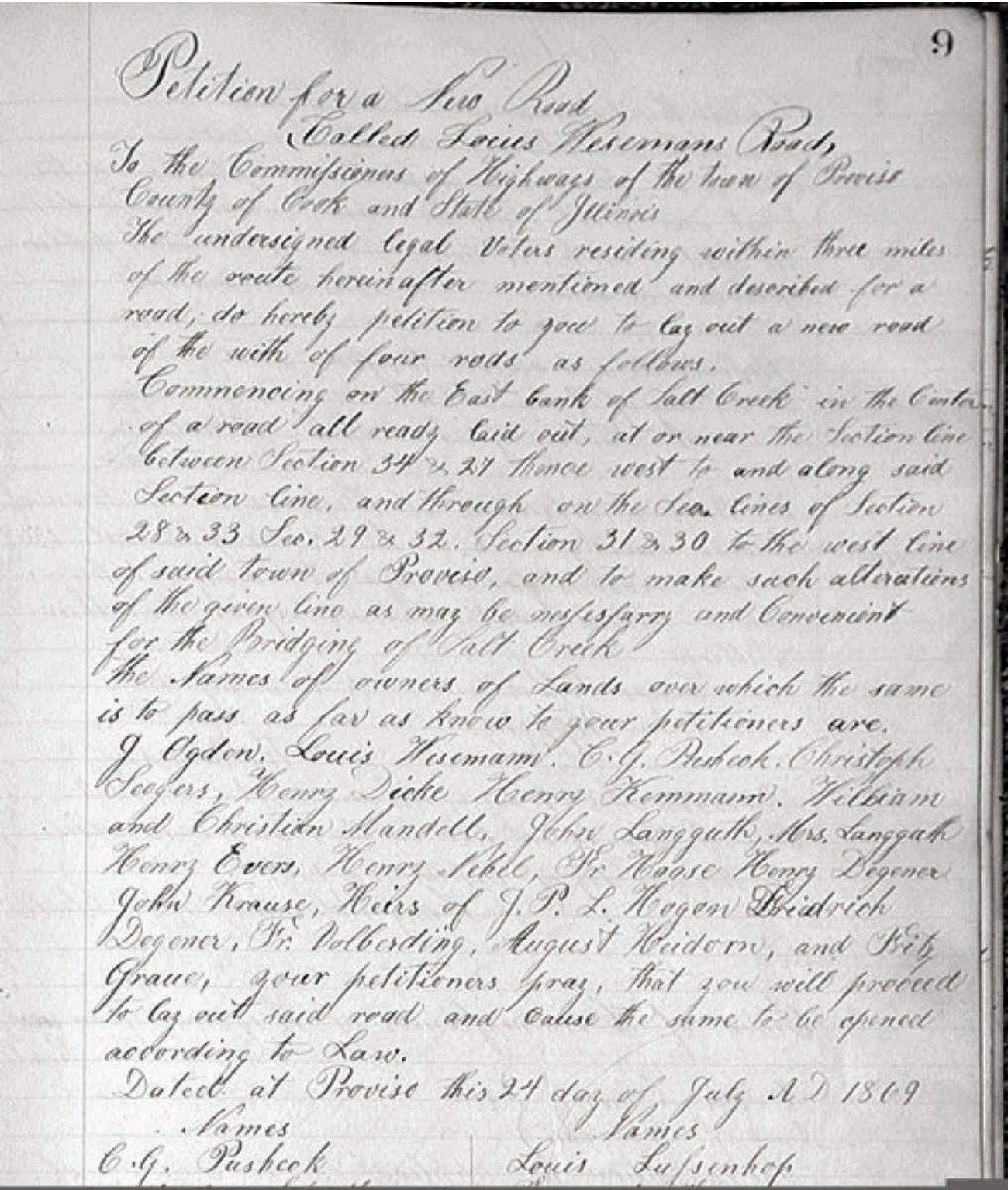
Westchester was created by Sam Insull and his developers as an English-style model town in 1925. As the town was laid out, many interesting street names made their appearance, and this article will explore the origin of those names. Many of them are based on English geographic and historic locations, some of them are named after famous British people, and others memorialize castles and colleges.

In the High Ridge section of Westchester, which indeed is the highest point of the village, you will still see the names of early German farmers and settlers who owned a significant number of acres of farmland prior to the establishment of Westchester in 1925. One can easily spot these German settlers' names when driving on Roosevelt Road east of Wolf Road: Heidorn, Boeger (there is also a Boeger Court), Mandel, Evers, and Haase. Gardner Road, which established the eastern boundary of the village, was originally Puscheck Road, named after the Puscheck family who owned land along the northern section in the 1840s.

Mannheim Road (named after the seventh largest city in Germany) was originally called Covell Road, because Marion Covell, son of original settler Thomas Reed Covell, owned the Hillside Quarry. Many streets were covered with gravel from that quarry in the early days. In La Grange Park, Mannheim Road (Route 45) was known as 5th Avenue. What we call 31st Street today was officially dedicated as Louis Wesemann Road in 1869, as we know from an official document signed by many of the local German farmers. When it was time to name Wolf Road Prairie in the 1970s there was a debate between 31st Street Prairie or Wolf Road Prairie, and the latter prevailed, being more evocative of nature. Still, the street name's source was more likely a family of early settlers named Wolf lived along Wolf Road near Butterfield Road. Most of the village streets were named after English locations, including the capital London. Mayfair is a district in London's West End known as one of the most expensive districts in the world. Fleet Street is associated with printing and journalism, as the first British printing press was set up there. Also in London is Bond Street, which is famous for exclusive fashions, jewelry and antiques.

Westminster is the cultural visitor center of London with Westminster Abbey and Big Ben, Trafalgar Square, and Buckingham Palace. Many streets are named after towns in Britain: Manchester, Bristol, Preston, Carlisle, Wakefield, Dorchester, Fairfield, Newbury, Bedford, Hawthorne, Stratford, Milford, Brighton, Worcester, Carlton, Ashton and Halifax. Walt Kent had a hit in 1941 about the white cliffs of Dover, which is also a town on the narrowest part of the English Channel. Canterbury, with its famous Canterbury Cathedral, is a UNESCO World Heritage site. Other streets are named after major English port cities: Hull, Portsmouth, Plymouth and Newcastle. Cambridge is one of the leading universities, and Oxford is the oldest in the English-speaking world. Then there are Buckingham Palace, Windsor Castle, and Balmoral Castle, all owned by the British royals. Counties in England are also represented in street names such as Suffolk, Norfolk, Essex, Kent, Somerset, Devonshire and Berkshire. A "shire" is the word for county in England.

Some streets are named after famous individuals. Thomas Becket was the twelfth-century Archbishop of Canterbury who was murdered in the cathedral there following a struggle with King Henry II over decision-making powers in the Church of England. Queen Elizabeth the First has a street named after her. Interestingly, Virginia was named for her as well, and what is now Illinois belonged to the state of Virginia for a time in the early Revolutionary War. Oliver Cromwell was a statesman, politician, and soldier who became Lord Protector of the Commonwealth of England after the execution of King Charles I. Several streets are named after literary figures, such as William Shakespeare, Charles Dickens, Geoffrey Chaucer, George Bernard Shaw, Mary Shelley and Robert Burns, the Scottish poet. Admiral Horatio Nelson was one of the greatest

naval commanders known for victories at sea during the French Revolution and the Napoleonic Wars.

Severely wounded while in command, he met his end at the Battle of Trafalgar. In London one finds a famous commemorative column dedicated to Nelson on Trafalgar Square. There is also a nod to Robin Hood, who terrorized Sherwood Forest by taking from the rich and giving to the poor. Kitchner Road was named after Horatio Herbert Kitchner, who played a role in the second Boer War and wars in Sudan, India, Palestine, Cyprus and Egypt.

He also served as Secretary of War in the early part of World War I, where he organized the largest British volunteer army before dying on the way to Russia when his ship ran into a German mine. Arthur Wellesley, Duke of Wellington, was a famous military leader and prime minister of England. He played a key role in winning the

battle against Napoleon at Waterloo in 1815.

Roosevelt Road got its name when 12th Street was renamed in 1919 to commemorate Theodore Roosevelt, who died that year. Cermak became an alternate name for 22nd Street in 1933 after Anton Cermak, Mayor of Chicago, was killed in that year in an attack likely aimed at President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt. On October 12, 1960, the Congress Parkway officially opened with a ribbon-cutting ceremony; it was renamed in 1964 as the Dwight D. Eisenhower Expressway, creating Westchester's northern boundary. The street names evoke a rich cultural history in the model community of Westchester.

To help you get started, we're offering an informational Town Hall meeting on August 19, at 6:00 PM at Village Hall. We'll walk through how to sign up, how to navigate the portal, and how to make the most of the new features.

Don't miss this opportunity to take control of your water usage, avoid surprises on your bill, and help us build a more efficient, responsive utility system.

New Water & Sewer Rates

These changes took effect July 1, 2025, following a professional rate study, and represent the next phase of the Village's multi-year plan to address aging infrastructure, comply with the State's Lead Service Line Replacement Mandate, and maintain long-term financial sustainability of our water and sewer systems.

New Rates Effective July 1, 2025:

- **Water usage:** \$19.21 per 1,000 gallons
- **Sewer usage:** \$4.03 per 1,000 gallons
- **Water infrastructure fee:** \$22 per month
- **Sewer infrastructure fee:** \$15 per month

These rates will appear on the **September 2025 utility bills**.

The approved ordinance also includes a 10% increase in July 2026, a 5% increase in July 2027, and then annual increases of 3–5% to keep pace with infrastructure maintenance and water delivery costs.

Please note: Garbage rates as of July 1, 2025, will be \$21.65 per month (or \$18.56 per month for senior households), based on the standard annual increase in the Village's solid waste contract.

Water Fixture Efficiency Reimbursement Grant Program

The Village of Westchester is offering a Water Fixture Efficiency Reimbursement Grant to assist low-income residents in reducing water usage and offsetting the cost of high-efficiency fixtures. Eligible residents can receive up to 90% reimbursement on the purchase and installation of lead-free toilets, faucets, and showerheads—with a lifetime household maximum of \$500.

Highlights:

- ✓ Covers up to:
 - \$200 per toilet
 - \$100 per faucet
 - \$75 per showerhead
- ✓ Must meet water-efficiency standards (e.g. 1.28 gallons per flush for toilets)
- ✓ Must obtain a free plumbing permit. Income eligibility required (e.g. Medicaid, SNAP, LIHEAP, or unemployment letter)

Utility Bill Hardship Program

The Village of Westchester offers a Utility Bill Hardship Program to assist residents who are experiencing financial difficulty in keeping up with their water and sewer bill. This program allows eligible account holders to apply for a payment arrangement through a formal hardship hearing.

Program Details:

- ✓ Account must not be delinquent at the time of application
- ✓ Residents must apply in writing using the official application

- ✓ Only one hardship arrangement allowed every 6 months
- ✓ Applicants must attend a scheduled hardship hearing – missing it counts as your one chance for the 6-month period
- ✓ If approved, failure to follow the payment plan will result in termination and the full balance becoming due

Online registration is open for all returning and pre-registered Early Childhood, Pre-Kindergarten, and Kindergarten students. If you have any questions, please reach out to your school's Administrative Assistant or visit our website at www.sd925.org under the “Registration” tab. Families new to District 92½ can also register online beginning July 1st by visiting our website's [New Student Registration](#) page.

This letter includes a helpful [fact sheet](#) outlining residency requirements. As a reminder, families must upload residency documents online—there is no in-person registration or document drop-off. We've also enclosed a [quick guide](#) to assist you through the registration process and a list of [student fees](#).

To qualify for the Early Bird Registration Rate, all steps—including completing the online registration and paying any outstanding fees—must be finalized by **Tuesday, July 15th, at 4:00 p.m.** The final deadline for returning student registration is **Thursday, July 31st, at 4:00 p.m.** Only students who are fully registered by that date will be included in our class lists and school planning for the upcoming year. Teacher assignments and student schedules will be released the week of August 11th. If your child will not be returning to the district, please complete our [transfer out form](#) so we can update our enrollment projections and classroom planning and prepare your students records for their new school.

Important Transportation Reminder:

If your child requires bus service, a completed [Request for Transportation Form](#) must be submitted by July 31st. This form is available under the “Registration” tab on our website. Transportation will not be scheduled without complete registration and fee payment.

We will continue to share more details about school supply pickup, back-to-school events, and opening day procedures as the summer progresses. While our schools operate with reduced in-person staff during the summer, phone messages are checked regularly, and calls will be returned as soon as possible.
